Dr. James F. Jones, Jr.

assumed the duties of president and Trinity College professor in the humanities of Trinity College on Thursday, July 1, 2004. Jones came to Trinity after serving as president of Kalamazoo College in Michigan since 1996. Jones considers the continued strengthening of the College's ties to the community and growing the endowment among his priorities.



Prior to joining Kalamazoo in 1996, Jones was a professor in the humanities and vice provost of Southern Methodist University and dean of Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences at SMU. From 1975 to 1991, Jones held various academic positions at Washington University in St. Louis, including professor and chair of the Department of Romance Languages and Literature as well as director of the Summer Language Institute in France, Château de la Hercherie, La Croix-en-Touraine. Earlier, he served as preceptor in the Department of French and Romance Philology at Columbia University, and as chair of the Department of Foreign Languages at Woodward Academy in Atlanta.

Jones received his doctorate and master's of philosophy degrees from Columbia University and earned an M.A. from Emory University and a B.A. from the University of Virginia. He holds a Certificat, Degré Avancé, from Ecole des Professeurs de Français à l'Étranger, the Sorbonne.

Athletic Director Richard Hazelton



In 2007-08, the Trinity athletic program flourished as its varsity teams compiled a stellar 510-202 record. The Bantam men's cross country, men's basketball, men's ice hockey, baseball, women's lacrosse, and women's rowing teams earned berths to the NCAA Division III Championship, while several individual athletes qualified for their respective sport's championships. The baseball team enjoyed a historic ride to the program's first NCAA National title, breaking numerous records with 44 wins to start the year and a 45-1 final mark. The women's rowing squad finished second at the NCAA National Regatta, while the men's crews took home the ECAC National crown and their fourth New England Championship title in a row. The Trinity men's squash team captured its 10th consecutive national title with an 18-0 record and extended the nation's longest winning streak in any collegiate sport to 183 triumphs in a row. Both

the men's and women's squash teams and the men's basketball, men's ice hockey, baseball, and men's rowing teams won NESCAC titles.

Since 1982, Director of Athletics Richard J. Hazelton has taken strides toward creating a winning environment at Trinity College. Competing on the NCAA Division III level, Trinity College sponsors 29 intercollegiate sports, 15 for men and 14 for women. In addition, there are numerous intramural and club sports in which non-varsity athletes can participate. In Hazelton's tenure, the College has constructed an eight-lane, 37-meter swimming pool, 16-seat rowing tanks, a vastly improved fitness room, the nation's top squash facility, two synthetic turf fields, a rowing boathouse, and numerous improvements to the playing fields and facilities. The College's newest facility, the Koepfel Community Sports Center and Williams Rink, opened in 2006 to give the Bantam ice hockey teams their first on-campus home ice and provide a fantastic venue for skating and other activities for the campus and Hartford communities.

Hazelton earned his bachelor's degree from Marietta College in 1966 and received a master's of science degree in sports administration from the University of Massachusetts in 1976. Hazelton taught history and was an assistant football coach at Lancaster High School in Ohio from 1969-73 before becoming the head freshman football coach at Amherst College in 1973.

In 1974, Hazelton came to Trinity when he was named an assistant professor of physical education, head track & field coach, and assistant football coach. For eight seasons, Hazelton worked under former Head Football Coach Don Miller, helping Trinity record six winning campaigns and a 42-21-1 record, a .664 winning percentage.

In January 1982, Hazelton assumed the duties of the acting associate athletic director when Karl Kurth took a sabbatical leave. Kurth subsequently retired, and Hazelton was named Trinity's director of athletics and department chair. In 1989, Hazelton was promoted to professor of physical education. He has been a Core Consulting faculty member of Charter Oak State College since 1997.

During his tenure, Hazelton has been extremely active on various committees throughout the region and the nation. Previously the chairman of the ECAC North/South Hockey Tournament (1987-91) and a member of the ECAC Finance Committee (1993-96), Hazelton has also served on the NCAA Voting Committee (1987-90), the NCAA Football Rules Committee (1996-00), the NCAA Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports Committee (1998-00), and NCAA Committee on Committees (1990-93). In addition, Hazelton was the chairman of the NECAC selection committee for Division III Male Athlete of the Year from 1988-92 (member 1985-93), chairman of the ECAC Division III lacrosse tournament in 1990 and 1996-98, and a member of both the ECAC East-West Hockey Tournament Committee from 1996-99 and the ECAC Ice Hockey Executive Committee (1990-98). Hazelton was chairman of the ECAC Collegiate Rowing Championship Regatta Board of Stewards (member since 1995) and was a member of both the ECAC Football Executive Committee, the ECAC Marketing Committee, and the ECAC Division III Basketball Tournament Committee. From 1982-1999, Hazelton served as the treasurer for the New England Small College Athletic Conference, and was president in 1990-91 and 2005-06. In 2002, Hazelton was awarded the General Robert Neyland Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

Hazelton and his wife, Anne, reside in nearby Windsor and have three sons, all of whom have studied at Trinity and played varsity lacrosse: Tad '92, who also played football, James '93, and Alex '99.

Athletic Facilities

No fitness and athletics program can be a success without quality facilities and equipment. Ours is no exception to that rule. Trinity's sports and athletic programs are enhanced by many top-notch facilities.

Central to all fitness and athletic programs is the Ferris Athletic Center, which houses many of the facilities used by students and athletes. These include our superb squash facility, the Kellner Squash Center, which is a fitting home base for the top men's and women's squash programs in the country. It features 10 international-size courts, two of which are constructed with three glass walls for easy spectator viewing, as well as pyramid-style, amphitheater seating that enables up to 500 spectators to watch matches on all 10 courts simultaneously. Trinity is the only collegiate squash program to use the white ball.

The Ferris Center is also home to the Ray Oosting Gymnasium, with seating for 2,100. It boasts two volleyball courts and two basketball courts and was the site of the men's NCAA Division III basketball regional playoffs in 1995.

Trinity's popular 5,400 square-foot fitness center offers the full complement of fitness machines and state-of-the-art equipment, including selectorized weight machines, treadmills, ellipticals, stairmasters, lifecycles, ergometers, and free weights. Cable television viewing is also available on both the upper and lower levels. The fitness center is open to all students and members of the faculty and staff 16 hours a day, seven days a week.

Other indoor facilities include a multipurpose field house with a 1/10th-mile track and indoor tennis courts, wrestling and exercise rooms, and an auxiliary gymnasium.

Swimmers and divers at Trinity train in our Natatorium, which features a 25-yard, eight-lane stretch pool and a 14-foot deep diving well with a movable bulkhead for water polo. The divers train on one- and three-meter boards and full-size and mini trampolines.

Trinity's rowing program takes advantage of both Hartford's proximity to the magnificent Connecticut River and an indoor rowing facility housed in the Ferris Athletic Center. The newly renovated Friends of

Trinity Rowing Boathouse sits just 15 minutes away in East Hartford. The spacious facility houses 12 eights, seven fours, and numerous smaller boats, as well as men's and women's locker rooms, a study and common room, and a land training area. In the off-season, rowers also stay in shape using our 16-seat rowing tanks and 40 stationary ergometers located in Ferris Athletic Center.

The Jesse/Miller Field, named after two legendary Trinity football coaches, features the College's football field with a modern FieldTurf playing surface, all-weather, six-lane (eight-lane straightaway), 400-meter track, and stadium seating for 6,500 people.

The College's wide range of outdoor facilities, also includes Robin L. Sheppard Field, named after another of Trinity's greatest coaches, a state-of-the-art artificial turf field hockey and lacrosse field with lights, along with two Class A soccer/lacrosse fields, softball and baseball diamonds, eight tennis courts, and four recently renovated intramural fields.

The Koepfel Community Sports Center opened its doors in November 2006, and is a multi-use athletic facility on the southern edge of campus. It features the Albert Creighton Williams '64 Rink, a state-of-the-art 200' x 90' ice arena that serves as home-ice for Trinity men's and women's ice hockey teams, and provides opportunities for faculty, students, and



staff to collaborate with the community through academic and athletic mentoring programs.

Designed as an extension of the Learning Corridor educational campus, the sports center meets one of SINA's key objectives—providing safe space for recreational opportunities and constructive programming for the community. The Koepfel Center may be the first urban community athletic facility in the country that connects neighborhood families with the resources of a liberal arts college.

COACHING STAFF



HEAD COACH: James Finlay

James Finlay begins his fourth season as Trinity College head men's lacrosse coach. The Bantam men's lacrosse squad had a 6-9 record last spring and qualified for the NESCAC Championship Tournament for the second year in a row. Two springs ago, Finlay guided Trinity to its best record since 2000 at 9-6 a best-ever third in the NESCAC at 5-4. Finlay is 21-22 in his three seasons at Trinity. Finlay arrived at Trinity after spending seven years as an assistant coach at Brown University.

Finlay earned his bachelor's degree in history and Classical studies from Gettysburg College in 1992, where he was a three-year letterwinner in lacrosse on teams that posted a 33-9 overall mark and captured two Middle Atlantic Conference Championships. Considered one of the outstanding young defensive coaches and recruiters in the nation, Finlay went on to earn a master's degree in physical education from Springfield College in 1997.

Finlay helped the 2004 Brown defense rank No. 1 in the Ivy League and No. 7 in the nation in his role as defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator. Prior to Brown, Finlay worked as an assistant coach at Notre Dame University for two years, helping the Irish capture the 1999 Great Western Lacrosse League title and advance to the NCAA Tournament. He served as the top assistant and defensive coordinator at Springfield College for three seasons, compiling a 25-16 record. In 1995, Springfield posted a 13-1 mark and advanced to the championship game of the NCAA Division II tournament.

Philosophy

The players and coaches associated with the lacrosse program at Trinity are equally passionate and competitive about the sport of lacrosse and what it takes to become a great player. We believe in striving to be the best in the classroom and on the field. Our coaching staff creates an environment filled with high energy and enthusiasm in practice, conditioning and year-round athleticism. Practices are designed to be structured, challenging, and fast paced. We believe in mastery of the fundamental skills and an intelligent and methodical approach to the game. Our goal is to be the best we can possibly be individually, collectively, and ultimately as a highly competitive team. Outside of lacrosse practice our players are committed to a year-round strength and conditioning program. The players work directly with one of our certified strength and conditioning coaches. The goal of our coaching staff is to enhance our skills, athletic ability, and knowledge of the game to compete for a NESCAC championship.

Recruiting

The Trinity lacrosse program is committed to developing a strong future and tradition of success. The NESCAC conference is considered one of the strongest lacrosse leagues in all of Division III. To be competitive in our league we are looking to attract the brightest and most talented players in the country. Recruiting is approached on a national level by our coaching staff to help our program become one of the best in the country in the near future. Our players are highly motivated, focused, and extremely passionate about the sport of lacrosse. The coaches strive to create an environment that will allow our players to excel in the classroom, on the playing field, and as leaders on our campus. Trinity has an extremely supportive faculty with an outstanding curriculum and resources. Our players are encouraged to reach their full potential in all aspects of their college life. Our team's primary objective at Trinity is to develop the balance of a true student-athlete.



Coaching Staff



Marc Graham enters his fourth season as an assistant coach for the Bantam men's lacrosse team. He came to Trinity in the fall of 2006 as the first assistant coach hired by Coach Finlay. Prior to Trinity, Graham spent 11 years coaching football, girl's basketball, and lacrosse at South Windsor High School. He compiled a career record of 95-80 as the head men's lacrosse Coach at South Windsor, which included two Connecticut Division II State Finals appearances ('95, '96) and a Connecticut Division II State Championship (1999).

Graham lettered in both football and lacrosse at Dean Junior College prior to graduating from Springfield College in 1994. He currently lives in Windsor, where he attended high school and was a classmate and teammate of Coach Finlay in both football and lacrosse.



Mike Kruger begins his second season with the Bantams, after graduating in 2007 from Fairfield University with a degree in communications. Prior to Trinity, Kruger was a four-year goaltender at Division I Fairfield University, where he started 49 games over his four-year tenure. He currently ranks third on the all-time saves list at Fairfield, compiling 536 saves throughout his career.

During Kruger's career, Fairfield earned its highest national ranking in program history, reaching as high as No. 11 in the nation in 2007. Kruger's primary duties at Trinity include assisting in the day-to-day operations of the program, running the man-down unit, and working with the goalkeepers.

In addition to his lacrosse duties, Kruger also performs game management tasks for the Bantam men's soccer team. He is currently working towards his master's degree in American studies at Trinity as a graduate assistant.



Jared Rife begins his first season as an assistant coach for the Bantam men's lacrosse team. Rife played lacrosse for national club powerhouse Brigham Young University, where he was a two-year, starting defenseman for the Cougars. Rife helped lead BYU to the 2000 MCLA National Championship. After completing a two-year mission in Nicaragua for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Rife returned to the Cougars for the 2003, 2004 and 2005 seasons, serving as captain in 2005.

Rife comes from a lacrosse-rich family, as his older brother Jason played lacrosse for the University of Massachusetts and currently is the head lacrosse coach at Division I Wagner College.

A 2006 graduate of BYU with degrees in American studies and Spanish, Rife is currently pursuing his master's degree in American studies at Trinity. He resides in West Hartford with his wife, Rachel, and their son, Jackson.

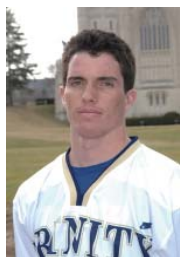

About the NESCAC

Founded in 1971, the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC) is a group of eleven highly selective liberal arts colleges and universities that share a similar philosophy for intercollegiate athletics. The Conference was created out of a concern for the direction of intercollegiate athletic programs, and remains committed to keeping a proper perspective on the role of sport in higher education.

The formation of NESCAC originated with an agreement among Amherst College, Bowdoin College, Wesleyan University and Williams College first drafted in 1955. Along with these four institutions, Bates College, Colby College, Hamilton College, Middlebury College, Trinity College and Tufts University are sustaining charter members. Connecticut College joined in 1982, bringing the Conference's membership to its current total of 11 institutions.

NESCAC members believe intercollegiate athletic programs should operate in harmony with the educational mission of each institution. The Conference is committed to establishing common boundaries to keep athletics strong but in proportion to the overall academic mission of the member institutions. In pursuit of this mission, the Presidents of each NESCAC institution control intercollegiate athletic policy. Conference tenets are usually more restrictive than those of the NCAA Division III with regard to season length, number of contests and post-season competition.

NESCAC institutions also believe athletic teams should be representative of the entire student body. Thus, admissions and financial policies are consistent with the NCAA Division III policies that prohibit athletic scholarships and award financial aid solely on the basis of need.

In 1999, the NESCAC formally became a playing conference and now sponsors 26 conference championship sports (13 for men and 13 for women). Member schools offer extensive and broad based intercollegiate as well as club and intramural opportunities for both men and women. With member institutions sponsoring an average of nearly 30 varsity programs, NESCAC provides more than 7,500 opportunities for participation in intercollegiate competition at the Division III level. Teams and individuals have achieved great success on both a regional and national level. During the 2007-08 academic year, 54 teams participated in NCAA team championships. NESCAC student-athletes claimed 22 individual national championships and NESCAC teams won seven national team championships.
